Important Note:

This amigurumi is worked with tight V-shaped and spiral stitches. Do not close off each row unless indicated; make sure to always mark the beginning of each row. Please read the entire pattern before starting. We have a tutorial on our channel to make this amigurumi. You can access the links attached to each image if you have any questions. If you find any errors in this pattern, please contact me.



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This amigurumi is approximately 19cm tall, and you can articulate its body. This amigurumi can stand on its own

Materials:

- 100% Mercerized Cotton thread (Sinfonia brand), average thickness approximately 3mm. Colors: Pink, Flesh or Skin, Brick, Intense Olive, Gold or Gold and white with 2.5 mm hook
- Super fine thread (sewing thread) in black just for embroidering the eyes.
- Wool Needle
- Scissors
- Time marker
- Pins
- Stuffing for amigurumis
- Glue
- Wire for articulating arms and neck. (14")

Abbreviations:

- R: Round
- ch: chain stitch
- MR: Magic ring
- sc: single crochet
- dec: decrease (close 2 sc together)
- inc: Increase (2sc in 1 stitch)
- dc: double crochet
- hdc: half double crochet
- ss: Slip stitch
- FLO: Front Loop Only (take only the front strand)
- BLO: Back Loop Only (take only the back strand)

Important Note:

This pattern can be adapted to create amigurumi of different sizes using yarn of different thicknesses. Adjust the hook size according to the thickness of the yarn selected. Also consider the size of the safety eyes if you decide to use them.

I hope you enjoy designing this pattern for yourself as much as I did.



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Arms (x2)

Start using flesh-colored yarn

R1: MR 8sc

R2-6: 8sc Change to pink yarn in the last single crochet of R6

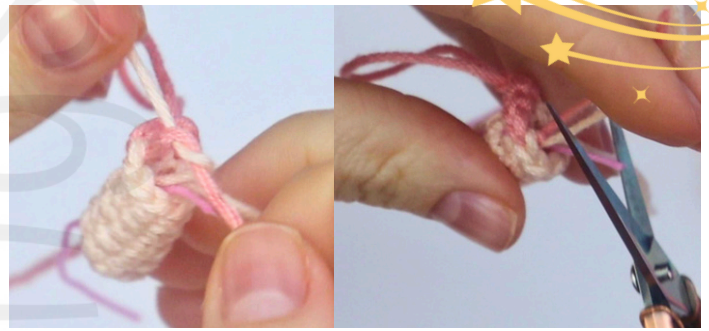
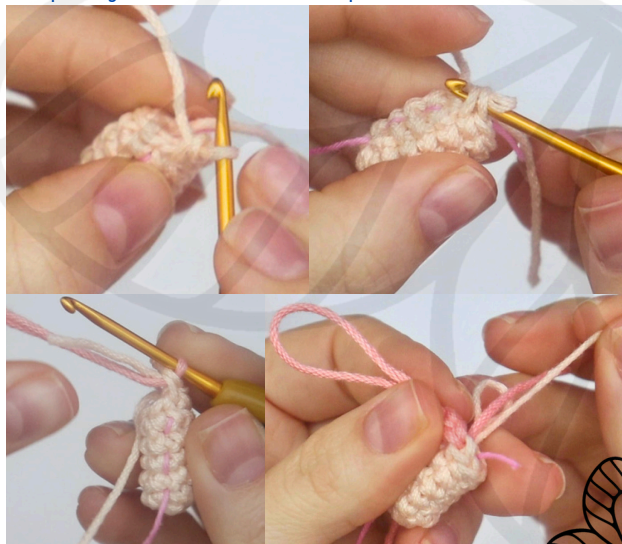
Every time you need to make a color change, follow these steps:

- Finish the last stitch of the round and pull out the yarn over a little.
- Insert the hook through the center of the stitch, as shown in the picture.
- Draw the new color and start the next round.
- Before finishing this round, pull the strand of the previous color and secure it to the new color with a simple knot.
- Leave the strands inside the piece so that they become part of the filling.

I won't go into this explanation any further.

From now on, whenever you make a color change, do it this way with the corresponding colors.

R7: FLO 8inc (16)

R8: 16sc

R9: 16sc reverse

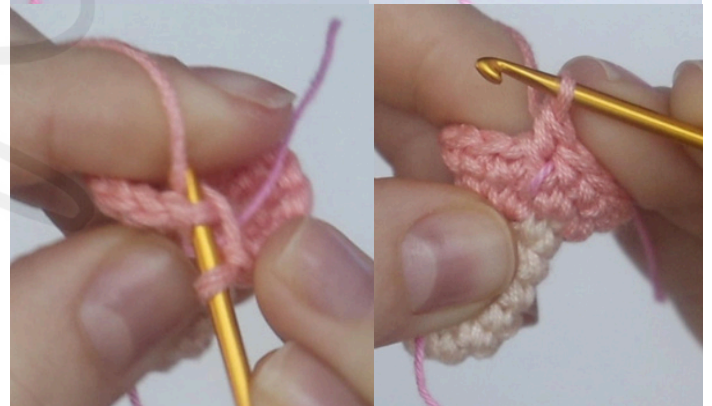
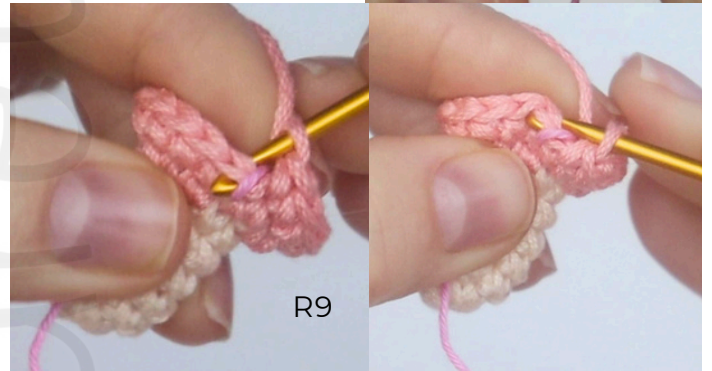
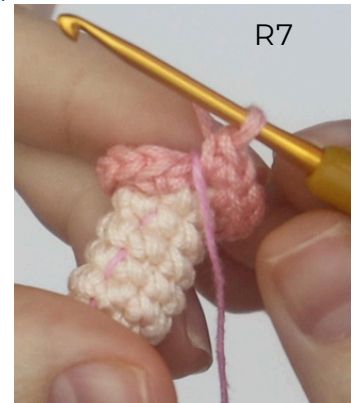
R10-12: 16sc

R13: (2sc, 1dec)x4 (12)

R14-17: 12sc

R18: (1sc, 1decx4) (8)

R19-20: 8sc



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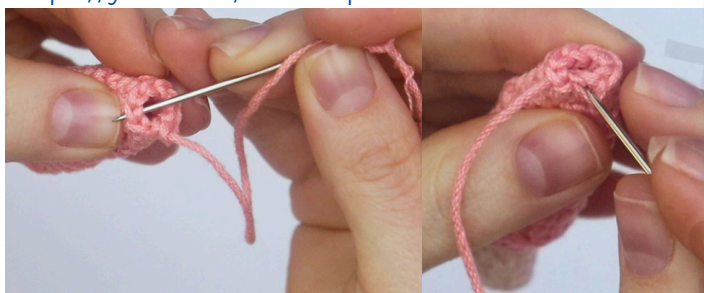


When you finish R20, cut the thread and make a perfect closure. Let me explain what a perfect closure is:

- After cutting the thread, pull it out and attach a tapestry needle.
- Skip one stitch and, in the next stitch, pass the tapestry needle under the chain that forms above the stitch.
- Then insert the tapestry needle just above the last stitch you made.

Whenever a perfect close is mentioned, follow these steps exactly.

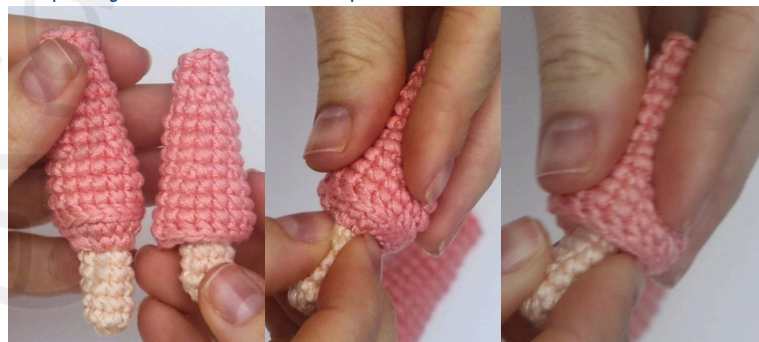


Inside, secure and hide the strand.



Adjust the arm so that both are even, pushing the skin-colored knit part inward. Later, when we attach the wire and stuffing to the body, this won't stick out as much. If you want to secure it now, you can do so; we're trying to simulate an arm with an open sleeve. These arms don't need stuffing, and you can attach the wire later so it doesn't get in the way when you attach it to the body.

Begin using Pink yarn

R1: MR 8sc

R2: 8inc (16)

R3: (1sc, 1inc)x8 (24)

R4: (2sc, 1inc)x8 (32)

R5: 1sc, 1inc, (3sc, 1inc)x7, 2sc (40)

R6: (4sc, 1inc)x8(48)

R7: BLO 48sc

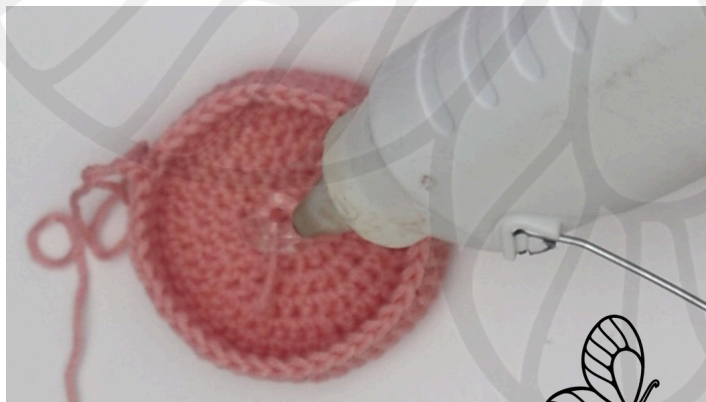
R8-9: 48sc

R10: (4sc, 1dec)x8(40)

Once you've finished R10, lay the base on a flat surface and apply melted hot silicone glue. Make sure to heat up your glue gun really well, as the heat will allow the base to set itself. When the silicone cools, the base will become firm, allowing your amigurumi to stand up very well on its own.

If you prefer, you can also place a button that is the same size as the base, or cut a piece of plastic that works well as reinforcement. I do not recommend using cardboard, as it could deform over time and affect the stability of your amigurumi.

R11-13: 40sc

R14: (8sc, 1dec)x4 (36)

R15-16: 36sc

R17: (7sc, 1dec)x4 (32)

R18-19: 32sc

R20: (6sc, 1dec)x4 (28)

R21-22: 28sc

R23: (5sc, 1dec)x4 (24)

R24-29: 24sc

R30: 4sc, 4sc joining one arm, 8sc, 4sc joining another arm, 4sc (24)

For this arm join, you will take the stitch from the inside out, and in turn, a stitch on the body. Unlike the next round, where you will work in each stitch that you left free on each arm.

Make sure the start and end of the rounds on the arm are towards the back.

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Back



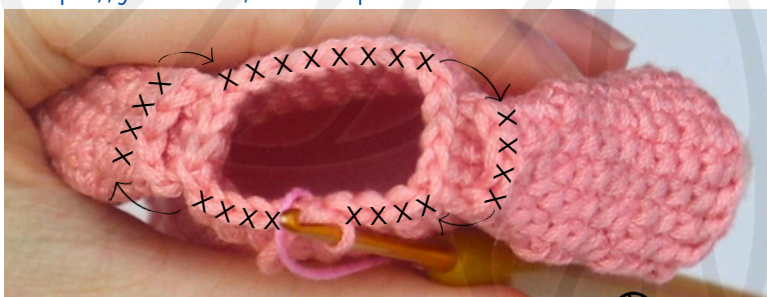
Forehead



For the next round, work the stitches as shown in the picture, skipping the four stitches corresponding to each join you made in the previous round.

R31: 4sc, 4sc on one arm, 8sc, 4sc on other arm, 4sc (24)

R32: 24 sc

After R32, put stuffing in the body before continuing to close. Make sure to put enough stuffing to form the body, so that the base remains flat and the amigurumi is stable.

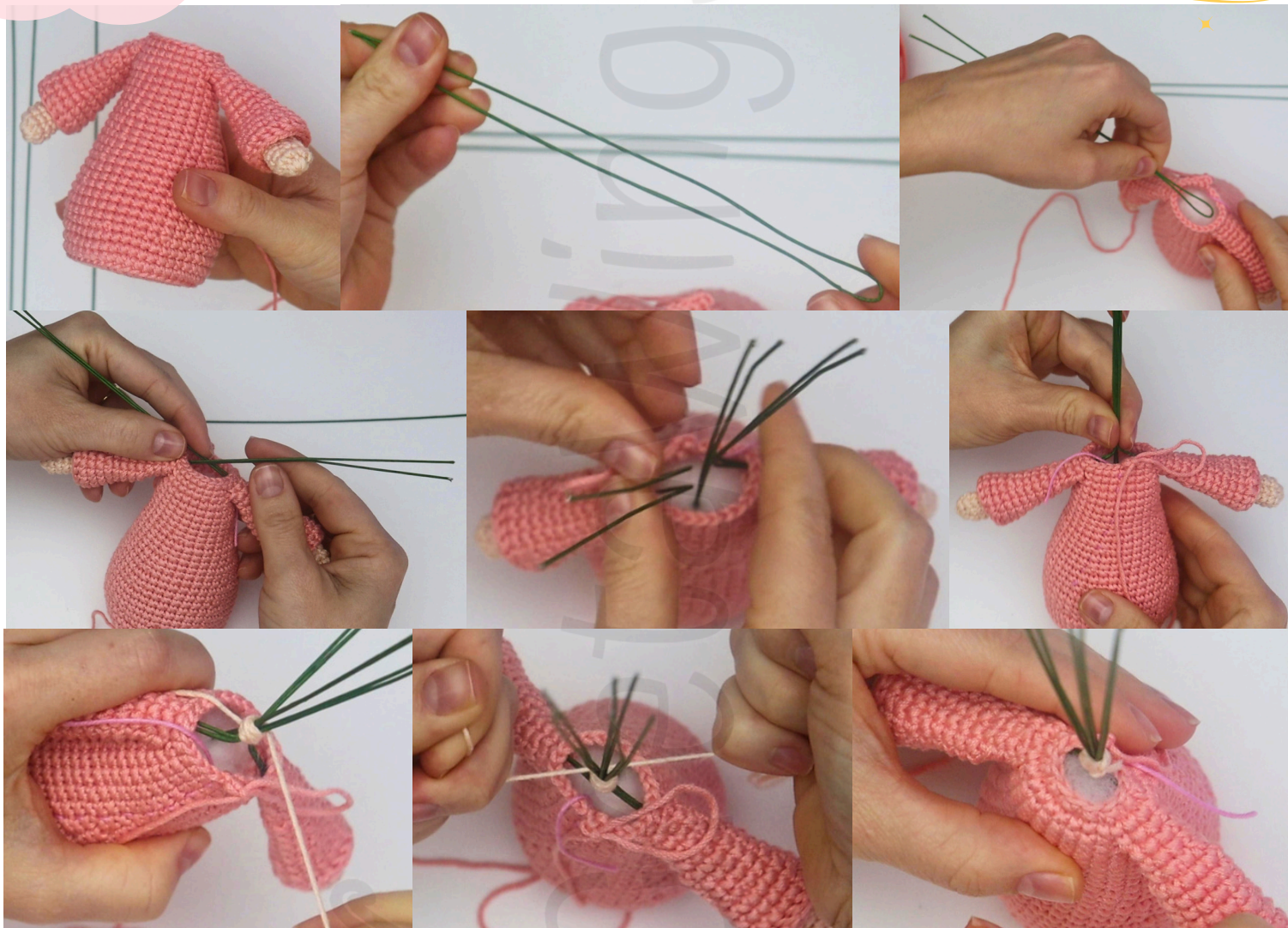
Place wire on each arm and bend them upwards into an 'L' shape to form the shoulders. Insert wire into the centre of the body as well - you can use another tool to create the hole if necessary. Secure all the wires in the body area either with tape or thread as shown in the pictures. After you make the next round of decreases, you can add more stuffing.

R33: 12dec (12)

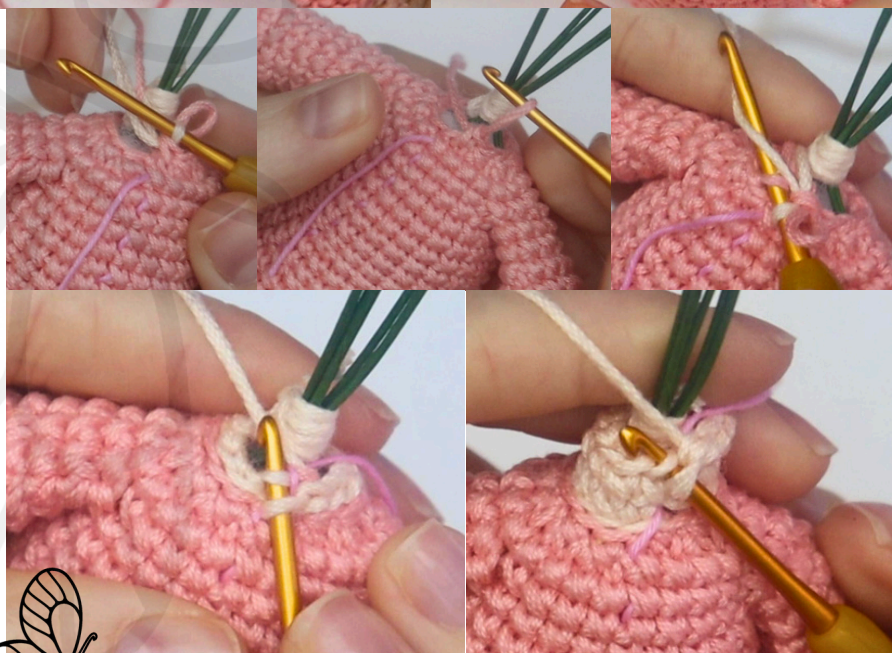
Change to flesh-colored yarn in the last decrease

R34: BLO 12ss

R35: BLO 12sc

R36: 12sc

R37: FLO 12inc (24)



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R38: (1sc, 1inc)x12 (36)

After R38, I suggest you add a little more padding around the wire in the neck area, to ensure a firm and stable shape.

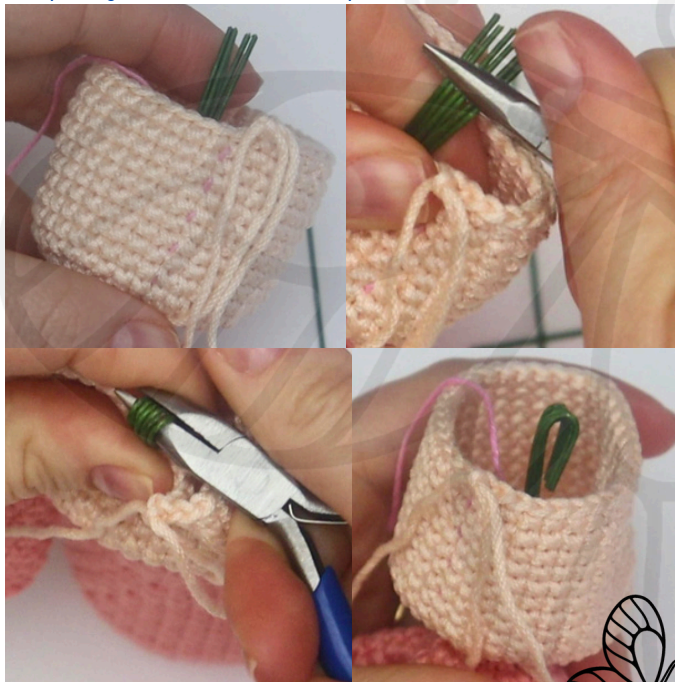

R39-49 :36sc

When you finish the R49, cut off any excess wire if there is any. You can secure more with tape if you wish, however, you can also simply bend them using pliers.

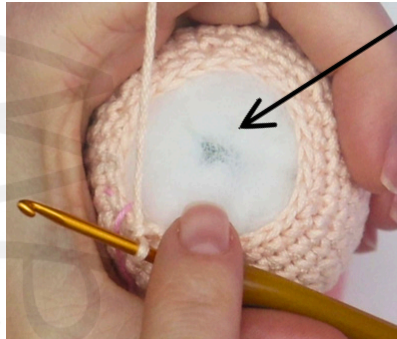

R50: (4sc, 1dec)x6 (30)

Fill the head with stuffing after finishing R50, always trying to keep the wire as centered as possible. Keep in mind that when you finish the last round of the head, you can add more stuffing if you feel it is necessary to give it the right shape.

R51: (3sc, 1dec)x6 (24)

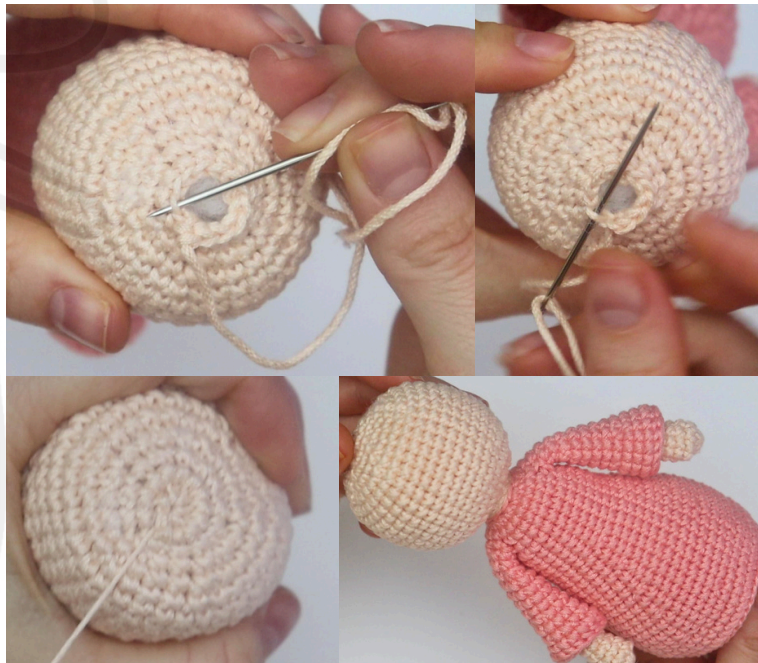
R52: (2sc, 1dec)x6 (18)

R53: (1sc, 1dec)x6 (12)

R54: 12sc

When finishing R54, cut the thread leaving enough length to completely close the head using a wool needle.

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Cloak

Start using gold thread

Start with 1 slip knot

R1: 81ch, in the 2nd start BLO 80hdc (with intense olive thread) (80)

In total, at the beginning make 81 chains: 80 with gold thread and 1 with intense olive thread.

R2-7: 1ch, turn BLO 80hdc (80)

R8: 1ch, turn BLO 36hdc, 4hdc dec, 36hdc (76)

R9: 1ch, turn BLO 34hdc, 4hdc dec, 34hdc (72)

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R10: Join, 36ss joining one side with the other, 1ch to secure.

Using R10, we will close the cloak. Fold it as shown in the pictures, pass the yarn under the hook and make slip stitches, picking up stitches from one side and the other. When finished, hide the remaining strands and then turn the piece over; these slip stitches will be on the inside.

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Ring of light

Use gold colored yarn

R1: 1ch, on the same base start FLO 36sc, 8inc,
36sc (88)

Note: You will work in the front strands you left free
in R4.

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R2: turn 88sc (88)

R3: turn, [skip 3sts, (fan: 4dc, 3ch, 1ss in the first, 4dc) skip 3sts, 1ss]x11

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Hair

Use Brick colored yarn

R1: MR 8sc

R2: 8inc (16)

R3: (1sc, 1inc)x8 (24)

R4: 1sc, (25ch, in the 2nd begin BLO 24hdc, skip 1st, 1ss)x12

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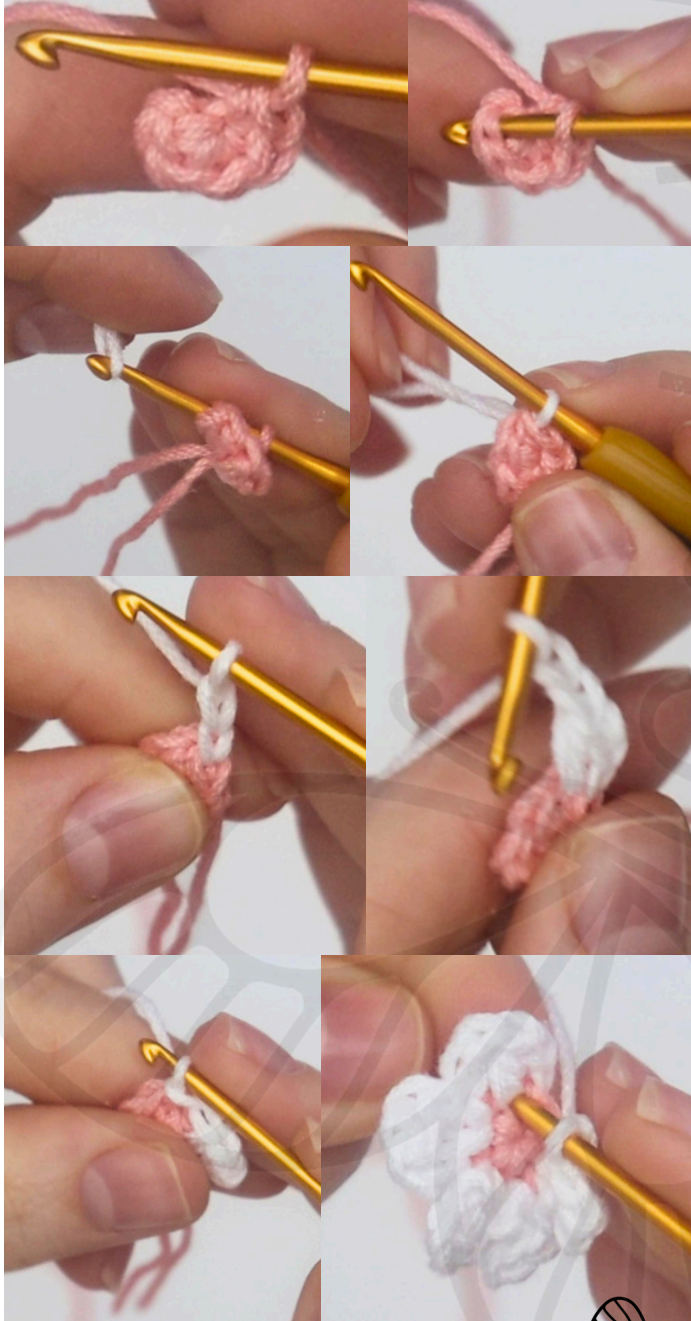
Flowers (x3)

Start using pink yarn

R1: MR 5sc, 1ss Change to white yarn

R1: (2ch, in the same base 1hdc, 2ch, 1ss in the next stitch)x5

When you are done, cut the strand and pull it back. Using the two strands of each color, knot them together and then cut them.

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Leaves (x6)

Use intense olive (green) thread

Start with 1 slip knot

5ch, in the 2nd begin BLO 1sc, 2hdc, 1sc,
1ch to secure

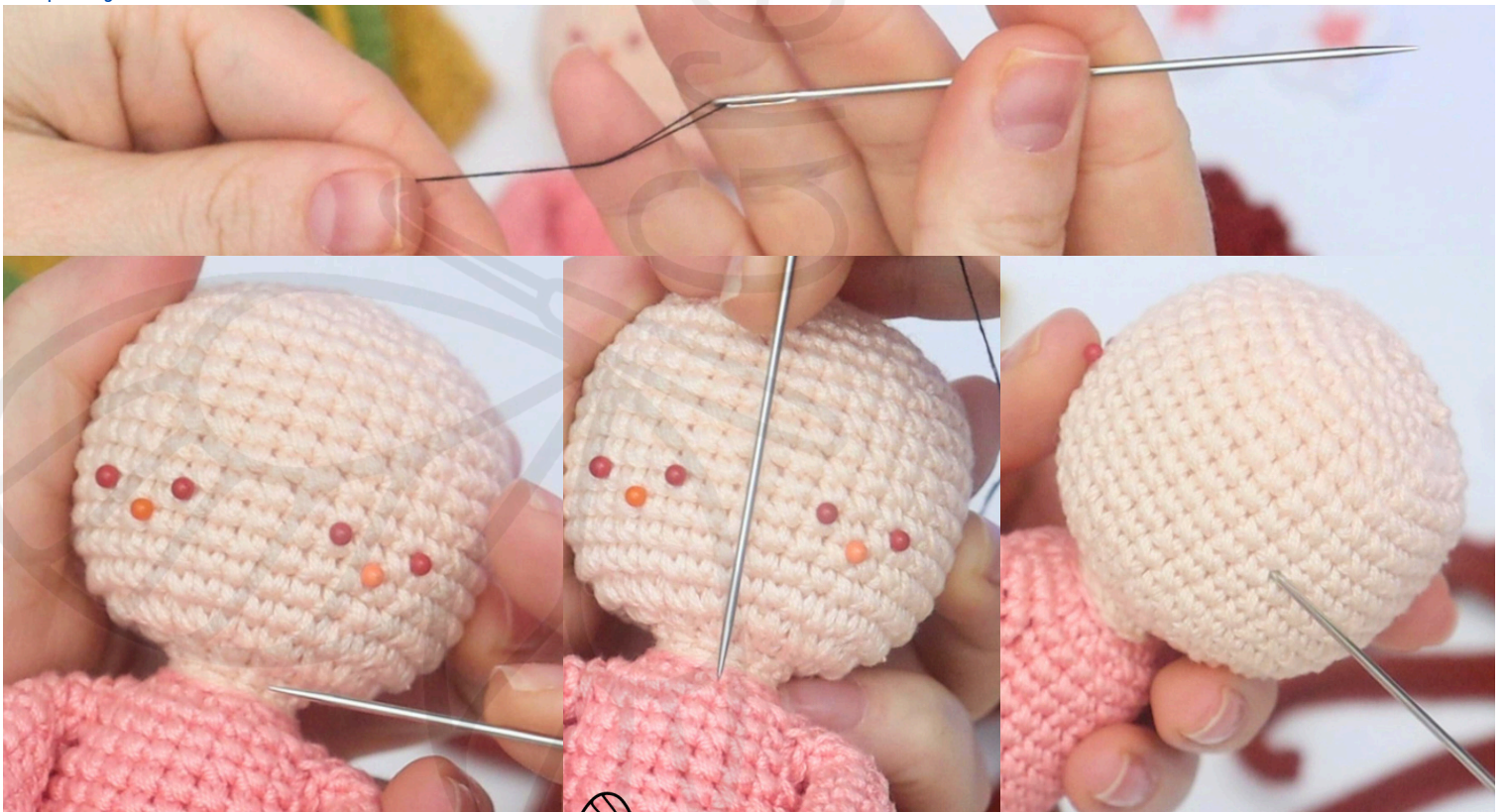
When you are done, cut the strand and pull it back. Using the two strands of each color, knot them together and then cut them.

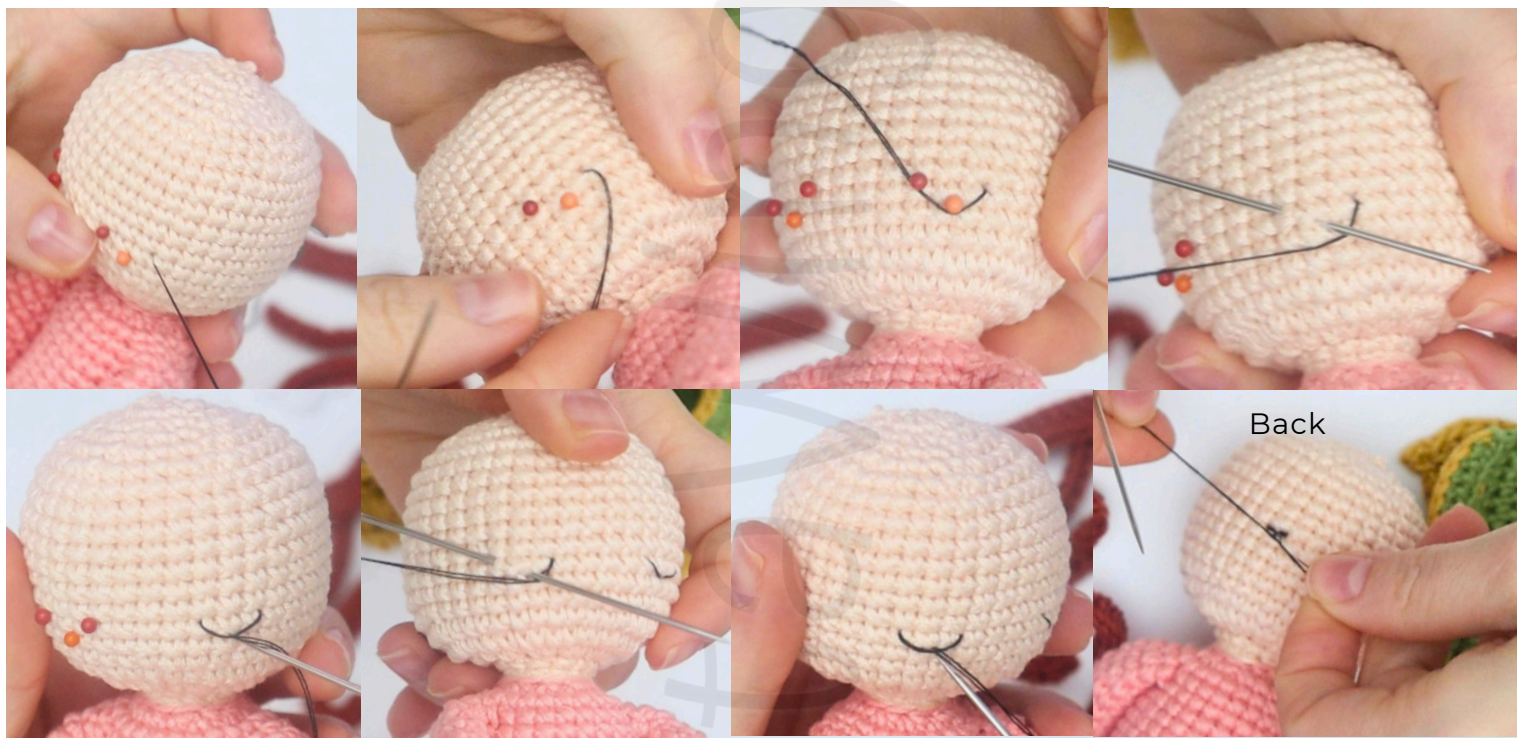
To embroider the eyes, start by placing a pin for each eye between rounds 41 and 42, leaving 7 stitches apart (determine a center point and then count 3 stitches to each side). Then, between rounds 42 and 43, place 2 more pins for each eye, forming a triangle. Use black thread and double strands, using the pins as a guide to get a neat, symmetrical position. You can check out the video for more details on the process.

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With the eyes ready, all that's left is to assemble all the pieces to form our Virgin. You can join all the parts as I did, using glue (whichever you prefer; in my case, hot silicone glue).

- Start with the hair: Attach the center of the hair to the center of the closure on the head. Then, with your hand, hold all the strands of hair, always leaving the front uncovered. There's enough hair to cover the entire head, but if there's a slight gap, don't worry. Remember that the Virgin of Guadalupe always wears her mantle over her head. In the images, you can see each strand one by one, and in the video, the step-by-step process without cuts.

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- Add the mantle: Ensure that it covers the back of the head well and that the first strands of hair remain visible at the front. You can secure it where you see the pins for added stability.

- Adjust the arms: Fold them and bring them together, just like the hair, leaving the tips of four strands exposed.

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- Place the flowers and leaves: Arrange them as you like. I recommend starting with the center flower; this way, you'll achieve a neat and balanced result.
