# **Important Note:**

This amigurumi is worked with tight V-shaped and spiral stitches. Do not close off each row unless indicated; make sure to always mark the beginning of each row. Please read the entire pattern before starting. We have a tutorial on our channel to make this amigurumi. You can access the links attached to each image if you have any questions. If you find any errors in this pattern, please contact me.

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This amigurumi is approximately 15cm tall, and you can articulate its body. This amigurumi stands on its own.

#### **Materials:**

- 100% Mercerized Cotton thread (Sinfonia brand), average thickness approximately 3mm. Colors: wheat (33g/each camel), sand, cinnamon, white, Nordic (blue), leaf green, Rosewood (Pink) and Gold with 2.5 mm hook
- Super fine thread (sewing thread) in black.
- 6mm safety eyes
- 4 Buttons or plastic/each camel (for the base of the legs)
- Wool Needle
- Scissors
- Time marker
- Pins
- Stuffing for amigurumis
- Glue
- Wire for jointing

#### **Abbreviations:**

R: Round

ch: chain stitch

MR: Magic ring

sc: single crochet

 dec: decrease (close 2 sc together)

• inc: Increase (2sc in 1 stitch)

• dc: double crochet

hdc: half double crochet

ss: Slip stitch

 FLO: Front Loop Only (take only the front strand)

 BLO: Back Loop Only (take only the back strand)

## **Important Note:**

This pattern can be adapted to create amigurumi of different sizes using yarn of different thicknesses. Adjust the hook size according to the thickness of the yarn selected. Also consider the size of the safety eyes if you decide to use them. I hope you enjoy designing this pattern for yourself as much as I did.

R1: AM 4sc

R2: 4sc

R3: (1sc, 1inc)x2 (6)

R4-6: 6sc


When you finish R20, cut the thread and make a perfect closure.

Let me explain what a perfect closure is:

- · After cutting the thread, pull it out and attach a tapestry needle.
- Skip a stitch and, in the next stitch, pass the tapestry needle under the chain that forms above the stitch.
- Then insert the tapestry needle just above the last stitch you made.

Whenever a perfect close is mentioned, follow these steps exactly.

Use wheat colored yarn

R1: MR 8sc R2: 8inc (16) R3: BLO 16sc

R4: 4sc, 4dec, 4sc (12)

When you finish R4, it's important to place a button or other material that is the same size as the diameter achieved in R3. If you don't have a button of the right size, you can cut out a piece of plastic or even melt some silicone to create a similar base. Keep in mind that with a flat base on the legs, your camel will look much better and stay stable.

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
R5: (1sc, 1dec)x4 (8)

R6-8: 8sc

R9: 3sc, 2puff stitches with 4 loops, 3sc (8)

R10: 8sc

R11: (1sc, 1inc)x4 (12) R12: 6sc, 2inc, 4sc (14)

R13-16: 14sc

Make a perfect closure using a wool needle.



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Stuff each leg from the sole to the puff points approximately. Later, we will add more stuffing to give it the right shape.

Use wheat colored yarn Start with 1 slipknot R1: 10ch, in the 2nd start, (8sc, 1inc triple)x2 (22)


R2: (8sc, 3inc)x2 (28)

R3: 9sc, 4inc, 10sc, 4inc, 1sc (36) R4: 11sc, 4inc, 14sc, 4inc, 3sc (44) R5: 13sc, 4inc, 18sc, 4inc, 5sc (52)

R6: 52sc

## Union with the legs

R7: 7sc, 7sc joining leg #1, 7sc, 7sc joining leg #2, 7sc, 7sc joining leg #3, 3sc, 7sc joining leg #4 (52)

For each leg, fold the top as shown in the pictures, using your fingertips. Use the center of the puff stitches as a reference. Then insert the hook from the inside of the leg to the outside, at the point indicated in the picture. Start crocheting 7 single crochets, always taking one stitch from the leg and one from the body. Make sure that the puff stitches are always facing the front of the body.

At the end, there will be 7 points of separation between the front legs and 3 points of separation between the back legs. For a more detailed understanding, please access the link we have shared with the explanatory video.

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"After finishing R7, make sure the legs are positioned correctly. If you notice that the low points look crooked, repeat the joining technique, but adjust the legs to bring them into the proper position. This step is important to ensure that the camel looks balanced and well-formed.

"The next round is very similar, but this time you will work the single crochets directly into the 7 single crochets that we left free on each leg. This means that you must skip the stitches used for the joins in the previous round. Make sure to always work into the next free stitch you find to maintain the continuity of the fabric.

R8: 7sc, 7sc on leg #1, 7sc, 7sc on leg #2, 7sc, 7sc on leg #3, 3sc, 7sc on leg #4 (52) https://youtu.be/FnN2n\_CmtMQ?t=2424





R9-10: 52sc

R11: 9sc, 7c, skip 17sts, 16sc, 3sc joining tail, 7sc (42)

Make sure to leave 17 stitches free, as centered as possible on the front of the body, as we will use them later for the neck. If necessary, adjust the start of R11 by increasing or decreasing stitches to ensure the neck is centered. The same goes for the tail: it should line up over the three stitches separating the back legs.

The technique for joining the tail is exactly the same as you used for the legs, except that we will knit 3 stitches joining in R11 and another 3 stitches in R12. Always check that the position is correct.

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






R12: 9sc, BLO 7sc in the 7ch, 16sc, 3sc in the tail, 7sc (42)

R13: 42pb

Wires need to be placed in the back legs to give the camel stability. Use a wire and lightly stuff each side of the wire (just a little). Divide the wire into two equal parts: one for each leg. Half of the wire should be inserted into each leg, while the rest is bent towards the tail for extra strength. Secure the ends of the wire with a bit of hot glue.

This wire has a total length of 14 inches, I cut it in half (7 inches for each leg) and bent it again to reinforce it, resulting in a final size of 9 cm per leg. Fill around the wire, but only a small amount, just enough to shape the legs without losing stability. This step will help the legs look even and well defined. The excess that sticks up should be tucked inside the tail. For extra security, apply a little silicone to the tips of the wire before inserting them into the tail.



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R14: (5sc, 1dec)x6 (36) R15: (4sc, 1dec)x6 (30)

R16-17: 30sc

R18: (3sc, 1dec)x6 (24)

R19: 24sc

Stuff this area of the body, remembering that you can always add more stuffing before closing off, even in the neck area. Make sure to distribute the stuffing evenly to get a well-defined shape.

R20: (2pb, 1dis)x6 (18) R21: (1pb, 1dis)x6 (12)

R22: 12pb

I recommend leaving the top of the body undone for now, in case you need to add more stuffing from the top later. However, you can easily add stuffing from the bottom as well. For now, just cut the thread and pull it out of the fabric.



Using wheat-colored thread, continue working on the stitches that we left free on the body, starting right at the corner.

R1: 24 sc (17 at the points and 7 more at the base of each chain)








R2: 24sc

Once you've finished R2, attach the wire. For each leg, I used a full 14-inch piece of wire, folded in half. The remaining end will extend into the neck and head area. If there's any excess wire, you can cut it off later.

Add a little stuffing to each leg to give shape and stability. Remember to also add stuffing to the neck as you progress through the knitting or at the end, depending on your preference.

R3: (4sc, 1dec)x4 (20)

R4-5: 20sc

R6: (3sc, 1dec)x4 (16)

R7-14: 16sc

R15: (3sc, 1dec)x4 (20)

When finished, cut the thread leaving enough length to make a perfect closure using a wool needle.

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#### Head

Start using Sand colored yarn

R1: MR 6sc R2: 6inc (12)

R3: (3sc, 1inc)x3 (15)

R4-6: 15sc Change to wheat colored yarn in

the last sc of R6

Every time you need to make a color change, follow these steps:

- Finish the last stitch of the round and pull out the varn over slightly.
- Insert the hook through the center of the stitch, as shown in the picture.
- Draw the new color and start the next round.
- Before finishing this round, pull the strand of the previous color and secure it to the new color with a simple knot.
- Leave the strands inside the piece so that they become part of the filling.

I won't go into this explanation any further. From now on, whenever you make a color change, do it this way with the corresponding colors.

R7: BLO 15ss R8: BLO 15sc

R9: (4sc, 1inc)x3 (18)

R10: 18sc

R11: (2sc, linc)x6 (24)

R12-15: 24sc

Place safety eyes between R10 and 11 with 8

stitches of separation.

Place 6mm safety eyes between R10 and R11, leaving 8 stitches between them. Make sure that the closure and the start of each round are at the bottom. For extra security, you can fix the eyes with heat (for example, by carefully applying a little fire). Remember to fill the amigurumi at the time that is most convenient for you.

R16: (2sc, 1dec)x6 (18) R17: (1sc, 1dec)x6 (12)

R18: 12sc

Stuff the head and cut the yarn, leaving enough to fasten it off later. Pull the yarn out but do not fasten off the head yet.

Before doing so, we will make the embroidered details, making sure that each stitch is secured from the back for greater security and cleanliness.

The embroidered detail above the eye consists of just two simple stitches, using wheat-colored thread (the same one you used for the skin). Stitch from side to side of the eye, making sure they are symmetrical and clean. https://youtu.be/K8i5BlzifUI?t=613





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Using only two strands of white thread (from a yarn that contains a total of 6 strands), embroider the following detail. This consists of a single stitch located at the bottom of the eye, more towards the back. Make sure it is delicate and well positioned.

## Ears (x2)



Use wheat-colored yarn AM, 1sc, 1hdc, 3dc, 1hdc, 1sc

Cut the strand, leaving enough to secure it with the starting strand and attach it to the head. Use the same hook to pull the strand back through the first single crochet you made; this will help close the ear a bit.

Attach the ears to the head between R14 and R15, leaving 6 points of separation between them and making sure that they are as centered as possible with the eyes. To join them, pass both strands towards the back and tie a firm knot. If you prefer, you can also glue them with a suitable adhesive.

Close the head using a tapestry needle, making sure it is well sealed to keep the shape and filling in place.

Using tan yarn, weave the strap. It is very important to start on the same side as shown in the picture. Pull out a loop, leaving a slightly long strand at the beginning, which you will later use to secure together with the one at the end.

Knit 50ch (or as many as you like) and, leaving about 9 sts in the other direction, slip stitch between R6 and R7. Make sure to pay attention to the pictures or refer to the video if necessary.

Leave a slip stitch unmade to complete the perfect closure with a tapestry needle. Pull the strand back to the back, along with the starting strand, and secure them together with a tight knot. Finally, hide both strands for a neat finish.

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To attach the head to the neck, first cut off the excess wire.

Then, using a punch, create a hole in the center of the head, at the bottom, making sure that the head is centered. Adjust as many times as necessary to achieve a proper position.

Use a tapestry needle and only two strands of the same thread to attach the head to the collar

with a neat seam. When sewing, only pick up the front strands of each stitch on the collar, making sure not to skip any. This will give a nice, even finish.

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
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Using black, double-stranded sewing thread, embroider the nose. Basically, form a 'V' as centered as possible and then add a straight line down from the apex of the 'V'. If you need additional help, check out the video for a clear visual reference.

R1: MR 6sc

R2: 6inc (12)

R3: (1sc, 1inc)x6 (18)

R4: (2sc, 1inc)x6 (24)

R5: 24sc

R6: (3sc, 1inc)x6 (30)

R7: 30sc

R8: (4sc, 1inc)x6 (36)

Cambiar a hilo color preferido (palo de rosa)

R9: BLO 36ss

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When you finish the last slipped stitch, break the yarn and bring it to the back to secure it.

Using gold thread, start a slip knot and insert your hook into the base of any slipped stitch from the previous round.

Work the sequence:

(1 elongated sc, 6 chains, 1 slip stitch in 3rd chain from hook, 3 chains) x9.

It ends with a perfect closure after the last 3 chains. If the pictures are not enough, check out the video for a more detailed reference.

Secure and hide all the strands before moving on to the next detail. Using gold thread, add slip stitches between R7 and R8. Leave one slip stitch unmade to finish off neatly using a tapestry needle. Make sure the strands are well hidden for a neat finish.






With rosewood thread MR 2ch, 2dc, 2ch, 1ss

Before closing the magic ring, thread the final strand to the back through the inside of the ring. Then, close the magic ring and hide both strands neatly in the back of this small piece for a neat finish.



Attaching both pieces to the head is very simple. Pass each end of the gold piece to the back, inserting them as close as possible to each ear. Then, at the back, secure them with a firm knot and hide the strands. The rosewood piece only needs to be glued, and it's ready.
